Glossary

Mount Olympus a mountain in Greece believed by ancient Greeks to be the home of their gods and goddesses.

Artemis the Greek goddess of nature, the moon, hunting, archery (among other things).

Elysian Fields in Greek mythology, the final resting place of heroic and virtuous souls; a place of peace and rest.

Eclectic made up of different styles; trying to use the best of various styles and times.

Hellenic Ancient or Heroic Greece; the era between around 500 and 300 BCE (about 2500 years ago)

Sagnaki a Greek food named for the two-handled pan it's made in; usually cheese melted and fried in oil, topped with lemon and eaten with bread.

Demeter the Greek goddess of the harvest, farming and the soil.

Trifecta a set of three things that when brought together, make something "perfect". The word "trifecta" was invented in 1970 by combining the word "Perfecta" and "Tri" (meaning three).

The Nine Muses a group of nine Greek goddesses who were believed to inspire people in each of the nine ancient Greek arts: Epic Poetry, History, Music, Comedy, Tragedy, Dance, Lyric Poetry, Sacred Poetry and Astronomy.

Narcissus a character from Greek mythology who was supposedly so good looking, he couldn't stop looking at his own reflection in the water.

Hestia the Greek goddess of the home, family and sacred fires.

Hermes the Greek god of messengers. He acted as messenger for the other gods. He was a trickster and was famous for wearing shoes with wings on them.

Athena the Greek goddess of wisdom, crafts and war.
